ABOUT THIS AWARD

The Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Diocese of Colorado Springs wished to recognize Catholic Scouts who received all four Catholic religious emblems, and so they created this pin to for these Scouts. This is akin to the Four Star award that P.R.A.Y. offers for Christian Scouts who are not Catholic.

ELIGIBILITY:

Scouts must have earned Light of Christ, Parvuli Dei, Ad Altare Dei, and Pope Pius XII. This is also often presented to members of other youth-serving organizations who complete similar work, such as the programs the National Federation of Catholic Youth Ministry offers. You may also consider giving this to Scouts who have converted to the Catholic Church after receiving prior religious emblems for their faith traditions.

COMPLETION OF THE AWARD

Troops, Crews, and Ships can present these pins at their Courts of Honor. This may be presented retroactively. It is recommended that this be presented after Scouts have received their final Catholic religious emblem, Pope Pius XII.

Troops, Crews, and Ships can order these from the Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Diocese of Colorado Springs via the form at this link: <u>https://oldwww.accs-agh.org/</u> <u>Brochure_Duty_to_God.pdf</u>. Verify with them the cost of the pins and shipping fees before writing a check.

As a reminder, the NCCS has implemented an online version of the Ad Altare Dei youth manual, an online Counselor's recordkeeping program, online access to the Bible, and support videos. A PowerPoint presentation with information about the new online program is available at the following link:

It is important to note that Scouts and their Counselor will still need to hold regular group

meetings, either in-person or virtual in order to facilitate the instruction and discussions required to complete the emblem requirements. The online manual does not replace this requirement, it simply makes it easier for Scouts to record their responses and Counselors to track and approve progress toward completion. This online version will allow Scouts to work on the emblem via electronic media at any time or any place.

The person talking said that if you were to look in the mirror every day and compare yourself to the day before you would not notice any changes. If you were though to compare yourself to 6 months or a year or two years prior, you will see the difference right away.

Much like physical health, we must reflect on our spiritual health as well; we must nourish it and we must persevere with it. Day to day comparisons may not show much fruit, but when we have worked at it for months and years, we can see so much difference when we compare our relationship to God over longer periods of time. Going to a gym to work out, you have to set goals. You have to start with what you can; you can't just jump on the heaviest weights and expect to move them.

Exercising the physical body can be compared to the spiritual life. We can read lives of the Saints and dream to live the (sometimes extreme) lives they lived. We can study, recite and use the thousands of prayers and devotions that have been handed down through the ages. It all begins though, taking that first step, building a strong foundation, and working to fulfill goals of sanctity. You know in your life what you are capable of, what you can accomplish, what you are comfortable doing. Begin with those but continue to set goals to go to the next step. Grow deeper in your relationship with Christ, not comparing yourself to what others are doing, but learning from what they are doing to expand your routine. Most importantly do not be boastful in our spiritual gifts, as St. Paul reminds us, but using them to be an example to teach and be an example to others.

Disciplining ourselves in virtue takes time, it will be a challenge, day in and day out may not give results we want, but over time we can see that great change.
