The Catholic Committee on Scouting hosted the 2023 Catholic Scout Camporee and Retreat at Cricket Holler in November 2023 and focused on scout skills and the Eucharistic Revival programs that the National Catholic Committee on Scouting (NCCS) has prepared. There were approximately 50 registrants for troops throughout the archdiocese. In addition to Mass on Saturday evening, Scouts had an opportunity for adoration afterward.

ABOUT THIS AWARD

The Modern Saint Series honors 20th and 21st century Catholic men and women who have had a profound impact on many people around the globe.

ELIGIBILITY

All young people and adults—Scouts or non-Scouts, Catholic or non-Catholic—can work on the activities in this series and earn a patch for each activity they complete. The activities in this series can be worked on individually or as a group.

ACTIVITY REQUIREMENTS

Young people must fulfill the requirements for their grade level to complete this activity. Adults must fulfill the adult requirements to complete this activity. Requirements may be found here: https://nccs-bsa.org/download/john-paul-ii/

COMPLETION OF THE ACTIVITY

After a young person completes the requirements, a parent, guardian or Scout leader will review the Scout's work to confirm accuracy and understanding. Then, the parent, guardian or Scout leader will order the patch from the <u>NCCS Online Store</u>. Detailed documentation of fulfillment of activity requirements does not need to be sent to NCCS.

PRESENTATION OF THE PATCH

Patches can be presented to those who earned them in a formal Awards Mass, Scout meeting, by family members, etc. The key is to make the presentation special, so young people understand why they have earned this patch. Also, the presentation should be done in a timely manner so young people are recognized shortly after completing the activity.

Religious emblems and new Cub Scout program

You have probably heard about the new Cub Scout programs and are wondering how this affects the emblems program. The good news is Cub Scouts can still earn the Light of Christ and Parvuli Dei emblems for rank advancement. Remember that Light of Christ is meant for Tigers and Wolves while Parvuli Dei is meant for those in Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light dens. Some long time pack religious emblem coordinators said that they prefer working with families to earn Light of Christ with Wolf dens as the program complements many parishes' programs that prepare the second graders for First Communion.

Given the demands of finishing the new Arrow of Light program before February Blue and Gold dinners and crossover programs, pack religious emblems coordinators might consider encouraging families to complete Parvuli Dei before Cub Scouts enter their final year in their packs.

As a scout, I was invited to go to Philmont about four weeks before the trek. It was unexpected, and I could not turn it down. Soon I was going to meetings to prepare, examining the packing list time and time again. Each time I had a pair of steel-toed work boots. At the last meeting before our departure, someone said to me "ounces turn into pounds". I was asked why I did not have lightweight hiking boots. At the final shake-down in Philmont, our guide asks, Why steel-toed boots? I replied the same to both: I wore them every day for the two months prior... I

I find myself in the midst of a move to an unknown location within Dayton as my order's leadership has determined it best to close the house I am presently living in. As I am packing, discarding, etc., as people who are preparing to move do, I am finding I have accumulated many items in my life. I have slowly been liquidating my Scout memorabilia, though that seems to accrue more quickly than I had realized. will be fine.

So it can be with Scouting. Many of us serve not just our units but also district, council, or archdiocesan scouting committees. We need to consider if we temptation is real, but we must embrace God in these moments and not fall into these personal desires.

As for my boots, they were comfortable and did not cause any problems. I was glad others had a concern for them. During Lent, we recognize our obstacles and, in a spirit of charity, help others with theirs. We must recognize that people are in different places in their spiritual growth. We can learn from but also teach others. Let us grow with the help of others and build each other up for a life of holiness.

are doing too much Scouting and how to ask others to help. I recently did this as I realized serving as a chair of a NCCS committee was one function too many, and so I will cease being that chair at the April NCCS conference.

I pray that during this Lent we can assess our activity with Scouts and see how we can use Scouting to draw ourselves closer to Christ instead of finding us stressed by the level of volunteering we do.
