Relationship of BSA in Cincinnati Archdiocese

On November 7, Bro. Andrew Kosmowski, chair of the Catholic Committee on Scouting for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, and Mr. Sean Ater, director of the Center for New Evangelization of the same archdiocese, met to discuss the state of Catholic Scouting in 19 counties of southwest Ohio. For the sake of transparency, below are the notes from that meeting, as shared between both Mr. Ater and Bro. Kosmowski via email to ensure their veracity.

At present, BSA (aka Scouting America) is not promoting stances contrary to Church teachings. BSA strives for neutrality and appears to be doing so successfully. If that changes in the future, the Archdiocese will need to enter into deliberations about the consequences. While Citizenship in Society Merit Badge has been seen by some as problematic, the paper Bro. Andrew Kosmowski created to support the merit badge counselors' knowledge of Catholic teach-


ings on diversity and equity helps to ease this concern. Catholic units' counselors are encouraged to consult this document as they prepare for offering the merit badge. Mr. Sean Ater examined this item and found that it presented Catholic teaching correctly. As such, Scouting America is permitted as a form of youth ministry within the Archdiocese of Cincinnati and may use archdiocesan and parochial resources. Furthermore, at the pastor's discretion, parishes may use the Scouting America program as a stand-alone program for girls, a replacement option for any GSUSA units, or as a complement to American Heritage Girls.

As the Center for New Evangelization sees BSA units chartered by parishes as a form of youth ministry, the archdiocesan guidelines for youth ministry and catechesis must be followed. Once these are received from Mr. Ater, Bro. Kosmowski will send those on to the five scout executives whose councils are fully or partly within the territory of

the Archdiocese of Cincinnati for distribution to all leaders within Catholic units. Likewise, Catholic unit leadership must participate in the archdiocesan Safe Parish programs and complete the background check for the archdiocese as well as those of BSA. (n.b. Catholic unit leaders should receive these guidelines via their councils. These can also be received from their chartering organization.)

Catholic BSA unit leaders, regardless of the chartering organization, are welcome at any evangelist, catechetical leader, and youth minister program sponsored by the archdiocese.

ABOUT THIS AWARD

The American Saint Series honors men and women who led heroic lives of faith that have greatly influenced American Catholics. Their words, their deeds, and their devotion to prayer and the sacraments, inspire all American Catholics.

ELIGIBILITY

All young people and adults—Scouts or non-Scouts, Catholic or non-Catholic—can work on the activities in this series and earn a patch for each activity they complete. The activities in this series can be worked on individually or as a group.

ACTIVITY REQUIREMENTS

COMPLETION OF THE ACTIVITY

After Scouts complete the requirements, a parent, guardian or Scout leader will review the their work to confirm accuracy and understanding. Then, the parent, guardian or Scout leader will order the patch from the NCCS Online Store. Detailed documentation of fulfillment of activity requirements does not need to be sent to NCCS.

PRESENTATION OF THE PATCH

Patches can be presented to those who earned them in a formal Awards Mass, Scout meeting, by family members, etc. The key is to make the presentation special, so young people understand why they have earned this patch. Also, the presentation should be done in a timely manner so Scouts are recognized shortly after completing the activity.

Adult recognition

We seek nominations for adults who promote Catholic Scouting in their communities. These need to be sent to the Catholic Committee by 10 January. We need this with wet signature of the pastor or his delegate. Arrange to scan these to the chair and then mail them to the archdiocese (all contacts on page 4). The Certificate of Recognition is given by the Catholic Committee on Scouting in the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. It is designed to recognize those Scouters whose attention to the twelfth point of the Scout Law, A Scout is Reverent, is undeniable. The candidate should show a history of fostering the religious aspects of Scouting especially at the unit level. There is no limit to the number of Certificate of Recognitions presented.

This recognition is offered by the Archdiocese of Cincinnati in conjunction with the National Catholic Committee on Scouting. It is designed to recognize those individuals who are actively involved in youth ministry through Catholic Scouting. The candidate should have a strong history of support for the youth religious emblems programs, a strong history of involvement with Scouting under Catholic auspices, and have influenced the spiritual development of youth and scout unit alike.
